#### TRANSITIONS

The summer term can be difficult for some children as we begin to plan for the upcoming transition, whether this be to a new class and year group or to a new school.



We have a range of strategies that we can use to support your child, if they are feeling particularly nervous or unsure about the transition. In addition to our planned transition afternoons when all children spend time in their new classroom, this can also include transition booklets with photos of their new classroom and key adults, extra visits to meet their new teacher or to their new classroom and next year's key adults spending time with your child in their current class. We also ensure a thorough handover of key information, which includes conversations between your child's current teacher and next year's teacher as well as myself. Pupils with an IPM will be contacted by their child's class teacher before the end of term to review progress towards their targets and set new goals as we look ahead to the autumn term.

Parents/carers of year 6 pupils should have already received information from their secondary school setting about upcoming transitions and support for this. I also recently shared information about the Mental Health Support Team (MHST) support for parents/carers of Year 6 pupils via an online workshop. Details of this can be found on the next page.

If you have any questions or concerns about your child's transition, please do speak to us. We will be happy to talk through any worries you may have and make an appropriate plan to support your child.

# Pupil Premium & Free School Meals

All pupils in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 are entitled to receive a free school meal. This is part of the Universal Infant Free School Meals (UIFSM) initiative, regardless of household income.

However, some children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 may also have an entitlement to benefits-related Free School Meals. Children in this group are also eligible for Pupil Premium – additional funding paid to the school to support your child in their learning. It is important to apply for benefits-related Free School Meals if you think your child may be eligible. This is so that your child's school can receive this funding. Your entitlement to Universal Infant Free School ends when your child transitions to Year 3, so it is worth considering whether you may be entitled to benefits-related free school meals particularly if your circumstances have changed (i.e your household income has changed and you are in receipt of certain benefits).

If eligible, you can apply for Free School Meals and Pupil Premium <u>online</u>. Please be aware that if you have applied and become eligible for Pupil Premium Free School Meals after 1st April 2025, your entitlement will be subject to regular ongoing entitlement checks.

If your child is a Key Stage 2 pupil and you are no longer eligible, you will be charged for your child(ren)'s meal via ParentPay.

If your circumstances subsequently change and you regain eligibility at a later date, you will need to reapply via the Cornwall County Council system, as it will not update automatically.

#### **Attendance**





Here at Sandy Hill Academy, we recognise that there are occasions when it is appropriate to authorise an absence, such as when a pupil is genuinely too ill to attend school.

However, the Government does not support parents taking children out of school unless the school agrees this is appropriate under '*exceptional circumstances*'.

Any request for leave should be made in writing (no less than 15 school days before the absence) to the Headteacher using the school's '*Leave of Absence Exceptional Circumstances*' request form, which can be obtained from the school office.

The following information details the government guidance that we as a school have to follow:

If your child is absent from school without authorisation, you will be committing an offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £80 if paid within 21 days or £160 if paid after this but within 28 days.

If your child is further absent from school without authorisation within any 3-year period, you will be committing a further offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices for a second offence are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £160, payable within 28 days. Importantly, fines per parent will be capped to two fines within any three-year period. Once this limit has been reached, other action such as a parenting order or prosecution will be considered.

Failure to pay the Penalty Notice may also result in legal action. If you are prosecuted and attend court because your child has not been attending school, you could get a fine of up to £2,500. Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court, including legal costs.

Absence not authorised by the school may also result in a prosecution in the Magistrates' Court under Section 444(1) or Section 444(1A) of the Education Act 1996, leading to a fine of up to £2,500 and/or a custodial sentence. Again, Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court, including legal costs.

Money raised from fines is only used by the local authority to cover the costs of administering the system, and to fund attendance support. Any extra money is returned to the government.

## **Arbor - School Communications**





All school communications are sent electronically via email and instant messaging via the Arbor Parent App only.

If you haven't already done so, please ensure you have downloaded the Arbor App via the App Store or Google Play.

The app allows you to receive the latest messages from school, book parent/carer meetings, track your child(ren)'s attendance, provide consent for events and activities as well as manage and update the information that we hold about both you and your child(ren).

#### We've chosen Arbor to help us manage our school.

Arbor is a simple, smart and cloud-based MIS (Management Information System), which helps us work faster, smarter and more collaboratively as a school. The Parent App and Parent Portal mean we can keep you informed about your child's life at school in a much more accessible way. Log into Arbor to see and update your child's information, get live updates and make payments or bookings on the go!

The Parent Portal works on Google Chrome (computer or laptop) and you can download the Parent App from the App Store or Google Play Store on your phone (Android 5.0; iOS 10.0 and upwards).

#### How to get started

- 1. Wait for your welcome email from us telling you Arbor is ready you won't be able to log in before
- 2. Click the link in your welcome email to set up your password
- 3. Go to the App or Google Play Store on your phone and search 'Arbor'
- 4. Click 'Install' on Android or 'Get' on iPhone then open the App
- 5. Enter your email, select the school, then enter your password
- 6. Accept the Terms & Conditions and enter your child's birthday

#### Need help using Arbor?

Contact the school office if you have questions about Arbor, the App or Parent Portal. Tell us the type and model of your phone, e.g. an iPhone SE, and include screenshots or screen recordings.

To safeguard student data in line with General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR), Arbor only works directly with schools.

#### Some tips to try:

- Ensure your username is the email address you use for Arbor. Ask us to check the email address linked to your account.
- 2. Reset your password from the login page, or ask us to do this.
- If the login email was sent to you more than 96 hours ago, the **password link will have expired**. Ask us to send it again.
- Ask the school office to check that your email address has not been used twice - e.g. on another guardian or child's profile.
- 5. Enter the birthday of one of your children to log in.
- Only relatives who are **Primary Guardians** of a child can access the Arbor App. Ask us to check you can access Arbor.
