It has been a pleasure to teach Apple and Cherry class, and we wish them all the best as their journey continues into year 1, and hope they all have a fantastic summer!





Where has the year gone? The children have achieved a remarkable amount this term and continued to grow as learners and as people. The multiplication tables check has been completed and the children have shown superb progress: these skills are really going to help their maths in upcoming years.

The children have enjoyed their topic learning this term. In history they have progressed their learning from the Roman era transitioning into the Anglo-Saxon era and then into the Viking era. The children were particularly fascinated by the Sutton Hoo helmet discovered in East Anglia and that England didn't used to be called that. In Art, the pupils have developed their collage skills, creating a fantastic animal face, inspired by the surrealist artist Paul Klee. They have also created some wonderful bee sculptures using clay as part of the Kingfisher Award.

In swimming, the children completed 5 intensive days of stroke work (and no doubt slept the whole weekend after). An exciting trip to Boddinick Farm was a real hit with the children: understanding how an organic farm works and seeing the wonderful creatures which live there, including bees and sheep.

## **Aspens - School Meals**



As a Trust we continue to work closely with our chosen catering provider, Aspens, to provide healthy and high quality meal provision to our pupils.

The new Autumn/Winter menu is now available to view on our <u>website</u> and will soon be available to book on <u>ParentPay</u>. Please be aware that your child's meal needs to be booked by 11:59pm on the day before the meal is taken. If a meal has not been booked for them, they will be provided with the hot tomato pasta option only.

As parents, the first day of handing over your child to the care of another can be an emotional time. As your child adjusts to experiences without you at their childminder, nursery, or school, parents continue to want to share in these times.

Tapestry facilitates this by enabling a personal journal, or diary, to build over time. Photographs, videos and notes of special moments are not only recorded, but can be made available regularly and often immediately to you via your iPhone or Android App.

## Learning Together

Google Classroom -Enhancing connections with learners from school, from home, or on the go.



Think of Google Classroom as your child's digital link to learning. Teachers use Google Classroom to share resources, links and assignments with pupils during lessons at school across the curriculum.

KS2 teachers will use Google Classroom to share homework with students and parents. It is a great tool for keeping up to date with your child's learning.

## **Pupil Premium**



#### **Free School Meals**

If your child is moving from Year 2 (KS1) to Year 3 (KS2) they will no longer be entitled to universal free school meals.

If your child is entitled to pupil premium free school meals, they will continue to be free of charge.

If you have a child who is about to start school and they have an older sibling who is already entitled to pupil premium free school meals, they will NOT automatically be entitled. You will need to apply for each child.

After you have been referred your social prescribing link worker will contact you via steephone to discuss the referral and arrange an appointment. This will usually be at a local GP surgery or community centre but we also offer telephone on video communitations.

#### Self-referral

If you think the service may help you or someone you care for, or to find out more, please contact the social prescribing team by telephone or email.



#### Together you and your link worker can:

- Explore what is important for your life and well being
   Identify the local activities and services you can
- Gain support and encouragement to start using services that can help you

## Summer Reading Challenge

It's that time of year again!

The Summer Reading Challenge 2023 starts on Saturday 8th July and runs until Saturday 16th September. The main challenge is for ages 4 to 11, with a Mini Challenge for the under 4s.

The challenge encourages children to keep reading during the school summer holidays – and to enjoy anything they like to read!

Children aged 4-11 are invited to set a reading goal and collect rewards for their reading.

It's FREE to take part, and last year 75% of children taking part improved their reading skills over the holidays.
